## Saving the World One Flush at a time!

When we asked our children whether they would rather have a sports car or a toilet not surprisingly many children in school opted for a sports car. The idea of talking about toilets made many of them giggle! When we told them that:

- 2.3 billion people in the world today don't have access to a hygienic and safe place to go to the toilet.
- 1 billion people go to the toilet out in the open where they are vulnerable to snake bites and being assaulted
- 443 million school days are lost each year through children not having access to water and sanitation

Children quickly stopped giggling and wanted to know how they could help.

So here at Sutton CP we plan to do something extraordinary for our Harvest Challenge - we are going to Twin our Toilets! By joining with the charity [toiletwinning.org](http://toiletwinning.org) we'd like to raise enough for each class to support the building of one new toilet in the developing world. That's £60 per class - or approximately £2 per child. We think we can do it and we'd like your help.

We've provided your child with a donation box to put near a toilet at home and suggest that every time they 'spend a penny' over the next week and a half they add a few coins into their donation box. Children will probably like to decorate their donation box - perhaps with some encouraging messages for the Charity which we can pass on.

Please bring your money box back on Friday 19th October where they will add their donations as part of our Harvest Festival. Extra collection boxes are available from the school office.

We currently provide school meals through North Yorkshire County Catering. They are free for YR/Y1 & Y2 and cost £2.82 per day for other year groups. Meals are freshly cooked each day in our kitchen by Mrs Johnson. Meals must be taken as a full week. With the exception of promotional meals (such as Christmas Dinner) we do not have the capacity to offer 'one off meals' For food ordering purposes the school office requires one week's notice to change to/from school meals.

## Learning to Love Reading!

Children's book author and illustrator, Liz Millions, visited us in September 2018. She was amazing and children were so inspired! Liz led workshops in the school hall and encouraged children to draw alongside her as she created fantastical characters with a sweep of her pen. Everyone felt like an illustrator at the end of the session and children were beaming with pride at their handiwork.

We bought some of Liz's books for our school library so that children can study her illustrations and we can remember her visit. Thanks to the team at Broughton Hall Children's Literacy Festival for arranging the visit.

## Social Media

Parents and families of children in North Yorkshire Schools are increasingly using social networking sites such as Facebook to talk to their friends. Sometimes parents have used these sites to criticise or make inappropriate comments about schools or individual staff. Making defamatory comments on the internet has exactly the same serious legal consequences as if they are made directly to someone else. Legal action could be taken against the person who has made the online comment. Similarly threats of violence can lead to criminal proceedings under the Malicious Communications Act 1988.

If you have any concerns about anything which happens in school, please speak to your child's class teacher in the first instance or make an appointment to see the Headteacher who will do their best to resolve things. If you are still unhappy, we have a complaints procedure (available on the school website) which will ensure that your concerns are investigated thoroughly and appropriate action will be taken.

Thankfully this issue does not often affect our school community. Hopefully this means that our channels of communication are effective, between us we are getting quite a few things right and, where there are legitimate concerns, you feel able to come and discuss them with us.

We have had a number of queries about bags in school since we have been reminding children about what they can bring into school. Please see below information previously circulated on our newsletters at regular intervals.—nothing has changed. Please support school with these requests—just as you try to keep your home tidy and orderly we do the same here in school. Instead of the belongings of one or two children we have 217 of everything to organise and keep safe!

## REMINDERS

### School Uniform

We pride ourselves on the appearance of our school and this includes school uniform. There is plenty of choice within our uniform code for children to express their individuality—please note that we do not encourage children to wear

brightly coloured trainers and shoes with flashing lights can be a great distraction in school!

### Attendance

School starts promptly at 8.55. We ask that children are not taken out of school for routine appointments (such as dental/medical/optician). Proof of any appointments during the school day is always required. If you fail to provide this, your child's absence may be recorded as unauthorised which could lead to referral to the Area Prevention Service. If your child is absent, you should notify school by phone before 9.30 am.

### Lunch boxes

We have trolleys to keep lunch boxes on for each class. Packed lunches are stored during the morning in a cool place and children are asked not to keep their lunch in the cloakroom where there are heating pipes. We therefore ask that when your child brings a lunchbox to school, it is small enough to fit on the trolleys. The trolleys take standard size children's lunchboxes but are not built to store large bags.

### PE bags and kit

Every child has a named school PE bag which should be brought to school every Monday and taken home for washing every Friday. Please ensure PE kit is labelled with your child's name. Children from Y1-Y6 need black shorts, white T shirt and pumps/trainers. You might like to send them with dark coloured jogging bottoms and a school purple sports hoodie when the weather gets colder. Your child will be able to tell you whether they are planning inside or outside PE this term. **We do not have the space to store large unwieldy bags and ask that children do not bring them into school—school book bags can be purchased for home learning/reading books.** Jewellery including hooped earrings are not permitted. Pierced earrings should be studs.

### Medicines in School

If your child needs to take a prescribed medicine during the school day, please see Mrs Wallace in the school office to complete a form. Non prescribed medications (such as cough sweets) are not allowed in school.

We welcome donations of good quality unwanted uniform for our 'New to you' school uniform shop. 'New to you' uniform is available for a small donation to school. If you would like to browse our current stock please pop into the school office.

### LOST PROPERTY

# School Improvement Priority 2018/19...

## Priority 1 : I will use words well

Helping children to develop their vocabulary is vital and communication is key.

It's something that applies to all aspects of life - and it applies to our children, too. Children need to learn how to communicate their needs and their wants clearly, and to share information with others. This is not only necessary for school, but it's also a life skill - and one we need to invest time in developing. An important part of this is supporting children to expand their vocabulary which is crucial to helping children to achieve highly in school too.

### In 2018/19 we will be

- 1. Exposing children to a wide variety of language** Children need to be exposed to a rich vocabulary that challenges them appropriately to expand the words they know, through reading books, texts used in English lessons and texts used throughout the school day. When choosing books and texts at home and school we will offer opportunities to explore new words. This year we plan to invest the time in discussing new words and providing opportunities for children to use them in their speech and in their writing.
- 2. Putting vocabulary on display** New vocabulary can be a barrier to some children accessing the work in a particular topic. In classrooms you'll be seeing lots of word based displays and don't be surprised if your child suddenly starts to use 'words of the week' in conversations at home.
- 3. Experimenting with vocabulary** When we've introduced a new text, after spending time reading to enjoy and absorb it, we enable children to explore unfamiliar vocabulary within it. We're encouraging children to question new words when they hear them, to find out what they mean, using dictionaries and then to use them in their own speech and their own writing. Encourage your child at home by seeking out and using new exciting words, spotting them in the books you read together, even making a collection in their learning logs to bring back into school.
- 4. Making time for lots of speaking and listening activities** - Across the key stages, the use of rhymes, drama, talk partners and role play will give children great opportunities to experiment with using new vocabulary. Word banks of recently studied words for pupils will be available and we will be encouraging children to use words they might not ordinarily use.
- 5. Being role models** We are going to sometimes use new language that the children might not be familiar with. We will replace familiar words with another the children might not recognise, simply by repeating and rewording a sentence. You might like to try this at home.
- 6. Playing games with language** We will have a word of the day or week, which might be drawn from the statutory word lists or from texts we are reading as a class. Children will be encouraged to say the word, spell the word, look up its meaning, use it in their own sentences and write a definition for it. There are also plenty of great games out there that allow children to experiment with language.
- 7. Giving children real reasons to communicate** By providing children with chances to write letters, which are actually sent to their intended recipients; to talk to visitors in school; to make presentations to their own or another class; or to perform drama to parents. We will be highlighting the real-life ways in which communication is important and why selecting the best vocabulary for that matters. Activities like these give children a real reason to communicate and use their expanding vocabularies.


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## SUTTON'S GOT BRASS
